Guidance and Advice on In-Year Admission

The information below is for parents who require an in-year admission for their child at the school. You will find it useful to read it alongside the information, which is available on Salford City Council's website at www.salford.gov.uk

In-Year Admission

1. In-year admission is the process of applying for admission into an existing year group within a school. It does not refer to Year 6 to Year 7 transfer into secondary school in September.
2. If your child has an education, health and care plan, the in-year admission process will not apply. You are advised instead to contact your home Local Authority's Special Educational Needs Team.
3. The in-year admission process will apply in the following circumstances:
 - Children wishing to change from one school to another school within the area
 - Children wishing to change from one school to another school in another area
 - Children wishing to transfer from an independent school to a state funded school
 - Children who have recently arrived into the city and do not have a school place
4. If you wish for your child's application to be considered for admission, please follow the procedure outlined below.

Application Process

1. The in-year admission process is managed by Salford City Council (SCC). If you wish to apply for admission for your child, please complete an in-year admission form via SCC's website [Schools admissions • Salford City Council](#).
2. Please return the completed in-year admission form to SCC.
3. You will be sent a letter informing you of the school's decision. You need to be aware that if a place is offered to your child, and you fail to contact the school within 7 days of receiving the written notification of an offer of a place, there is a possibility that the place offered could be withdrawn.
4. If the decision letter informs you that a place cannot be offered to your child at the school, you will be advised of your right of appeal to an independent appeal panel. For guidance and advice on the appeals process please visit the school's website and www.salford.gov.uk
5. Waiting lists are not held for in-year admissions. If your child is refused a place, you will need to re-apply for a place if you still wish to be considered for admission.



Fair Access Protocol

For children that are unplaced and vulnerable, and those who are having difficulty in securing a place are allocated a place under Salford City Council's Fair Access Protocol. The Department for Education requires that the children listed below who have a difficulty in securing a school place, and it can be demonstrated that reasonable measures have been taken to secure a place through the usual in-year admission procedures are included in the Fair Access Protocol:

- Children either subject to a Child in Need Plan or a Child Protection Plan or having had a Child in Need Plan or a Child Protection Plan within 12 months at the point of being referred to the Protocol;
- Children living in a refuge or in other Relevant Accommodation at the point of being referred to the Protocol;
- Children from the criminal justice system;
- Children in alternative provision who need to be reintegrated into mainstream education or who have been permanently excluded but are deemed suitable for mainstream education;
- Children with special educational needs (but without an education, health and care plan), disabilities or medical conditions;
- Children who are carers;
- Children who are homeless;
- Children in formal kinship care arrangements;
- Children of, or who are Gypsies, Roma, Travellers, refugees and asylum seekers;
- Children who have been refused a school place on the grounds of their challenging behaviour and referred to the Protocol;
- Children for whom a place has not been sought due to exceptional circumstances;
- Children who have been out of education for four or more weeks where it can be demonstrated where there are no places available at any school within a reasonable distance of their home. This does not include circumstances where a suitable place has been offered to a child and this has not been accepted; and
- Previously looked after children where the local authority has been unable to promptly secure a school place.
